10.30-12.30 Exploring Cumbrian History from government sources using MS Office Excel (Dr Michael Winstanley)

This session has two purposes:

- 1) it provides an introduction to the wealth of material in official Parliamentary publications from the 19th century;
- 2) it demonstrates how Excel (or Open Office Calc) spreadsheets and databases can be employed to analyse the information they contain, particularly to understand county-wide developments and to identify changes which occurred over time.

In addition to the census returns, the government collected information on an enormous range of subjects such as agriculture; industry, poor law, trade, licensed premises, schools, charities, etc. The purpose of this introductory session is to illustrate some of these sources and show how Excel can be used to analyse a specific topic and source (Religious Census of 1851) following this up with face-to-face training sessions and other projects for those who would like them. The intention is to post any findings on the CCHT website. Volunteers will need to have MS Office 2003, 2007 or 2010 or Open Office on their own computers and internet access BUT no previous experience of Excel is required.
