Welcome to the third CCHT e-newsletter intended to keep you up-to-date with the VCH Cumbria project.

### **Launch of Jubilee Digests**

VCH volunteers met in Penrith on 31st January to find out more about the Jubilee Digests. Over the next 12 months, we aim to produce a Digest for every Cumbrian community for which separate VCH articles will be written: that's around 315 parishes/townships in Cumberland and Westmorland, a further 30 in Furness and Cartmel, together with three more for Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent.

The Digests not only celebrate the Queen's re-dedication of the VCH, but will form an important resource as a quick reference guide for anyone interested in the county's history.

Using information gathered from a limited set of specified sources, each digest will cover the 'status' of each place (parish, township, chapelry), its acreage, an overview of its population and ownership (manorial descent), economic activity, places of worship and schools. In this way, the Digests will build on the substantial progress volunteers have already made in gathering specific information about institutions in parishes and townships throughout the county.

Since the January meeting, volunteers have signed up to produce digests for 115 places. This means that we are well on the way to meeting our target of launching the first 100 Jubilee Digests on the CCHT website to coincide with the Jubilee celebrations in June!

Digest entries for towns will be more challenging, but Angus Winchester would like to meet with anyone interested in working on them.

We hope that all VCH volunteers will wish to get involved in this. Further information about the Jubilee Digests can be found on the CCHT website.

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#### A TRIP TO THE ARCHIVES.....

# Durham University Library (the Howard of Naworth Collection)

The University Library at Palace Green Durham, adjoining the Cathedral, houses the Howard of Naworth collection, an essential source for VCH Cumbria researchers concerned with the Barony of Gilsland and all townships within it.

Access to the library is free, and registration (usual identification documents) is quick and easy. Before going, thoroughly peruse the four-volume calendar of Cumbrian documents found on the shelves behind the search room desk at Carlisle Archive Centre; and having done so, advise the staff at Durham of your intention to visit and the records vou will wish to examine (pg.library@durham.ac.uk). Although somewhat elderly, the Cumbrian calendar is still in use, with the same numbering system, at Durham.

The best procedure, by car, is to use the inexpensive and efficient park-and-ride service. Lap-top computers are allowed, but not cameras, and only loose leaf documents will be photocopyable. The staff are helpful and the document retrieval service prompt. There are excellent cafes in the Cathedral and on the other side of Palace Green.

The library also houses (L+016.94274 CAS) the 6-volume calendar of records at Castle Howard: only a small part of this collection touches Cumbria, but it cannot be ignored. Further work will be necessary to clarify the full range of relevant material, and to establish access for Cumbrian researchers to it. This will take some months: please advise the Volunteer Coordinator of any urgent research needs in the meantime.
