#### **CASCAT Updates**

Cumbria Archive Service has recently made several additions to CASCAT, including a showcase of new collections. Among these are papers of the Thwaites Family of Westmorland (Kendal Archive Centre); sixty-three diaries Edward Wadham of Millwood, agent to the Duke of Buccleuch, 1851-1912 (Barrow Archive Centre); and an eight volume collection of photographs of the Settle-Carlisle Railway 'The Ways of Rails' (Carlisle Archive Centre). ## IN THE ARCHIVES.....

#### Dr Heysham's Statistics:

Dr Heysham (1753 – 1834) was a physician and demographer and Cumbria's premier naturalist and ornithologist. He is however best remembered for his meticulous records of public health and demography for Carlisle. These were known as his *Observations on the Bills of Mortality in Carlisle* (1780-88)

He also collected statistics for the areas surrounding Carlisle, principally Eskdale Ward [the Northern Division of the County of Cumberland], Leith Ward [South East portion of the county up to Eskdale] and the Cumberland Ward [15 parishes surrounding the city of Carlisle]. There are also some statistics for Caldbeck, Torpenhow, Bolton, Westward, Aspatria and one or two other towns

Unlike with Carlisle Dr Heysham does not appear to have compiled the statistics himself, relying rather on information supplied by local correspondents [often the local clergy]. The statistics are usually for the year 1781/2 and list; houses, inhabitants and new houses built since 1750. There is no consistency to the way the statistics are presented. These statistics are in manuscript format and may present problems of interpretation as the material is in very much a raw state. It appears these were the basis for some of the population figure given in Hutchinson's *History of Cumberland*.

These items are available for consultation in Carlisle Library. The shelf mark for the material in the Local Studies Collection is M839.

All the material has been photocopied to save wear and tear on the originals. Further personal copies would be best made using a digital camera.
