

SORTING OUT THE CLERGY!

Volunteers - We Need You

There are many ways in which volunteers can contribute to the VCH Cumbria project, short of researching and writing a full VCH township/parish history. Having recently completed my first article, I found quite a lot of time was taken up working out the names and dates of local clergy.

The VCH does not publish lists of clergy in its parish histories, but we will be able to post lists for Cumbrian parishes on the project website. Such information is a vital starting point upon which to build further biographical details and help gain an impression of religious life in the parish. For example, how long did individuals serve in the parish? Were they local? Were they University educated? Did they tend to be young or old when they arrived?



There is rarely a convenient list of vicars in the archives. But there is often a plaque in the local church or list in a local guidebook that can provide this information. These details can then be checked against the Church of England Clergy Database (1540-1835) - http://www.theclergydatabase.org.uk - and for the period since 1855 in Crockford's *Clerical Directory*. Parts of this are also available online: http://www.crockford.org.uk

What we would like, therefore, is for VCH volunteers to compile a list of Anglican clergy for their parish, preferably by making a visit to the church in question. As some churches may be locked, you will possibly need to seek permission for access. We ask that these lists are submitted, either as a word document, or as a good quality photograph to which you own the copyright. We can then post these lists on the relevant pages of the project website for future researchers to use.

Creation of Regional Heritage Centre

Lancaster University's History Department has been home to the VCH Cumbria project since its inception. We are pleased to report that the University is establishing a new 'Regional Heritage Centre' within the History Department, to develop its activities in engaging with the regional community in the field of cultural heritage, broadly defined.



The VCH project is now part of the new Centre, which also embraces activities hitherto undertaken by the Centre for North West Regional Studies. The overarching aim is to create an integrated area of activity in the field of history and heritage which will contribute to the social and cultural life of the region. CCHT trustees have welcomed this move, which embeds the project even more firmly in the University's work. History of the VCH in Cumbria

Professor John Beckett of Nottingham University, and former director of the VCH, has kindly allowed to post his article 'The Cumberland Westmorland Antiquarian and Archaeological Society and the Victoria County History' (originally published in CW3, XI (2011)) on the CCHT website. The article reconstructs the development of the VCH in Cumberland and Westmorland, and examines the role of CWAAS members and officers in working on the project. The failure to progress beyond volume II in Cumberland, and to publish even one of the two projected Westmorland volumes is explained, mainly from material in the VCH archives. The Memorial Project

In the autumn term, CCHT joined with the Cumberland and Westmorland Antiquarian and Archaeological Society and Mrs Claire Hensman, Lord Lieutenant of Cumbria, to launch a project to encourage primary school children in the county to study the impact of the First World War on their local community. The project, called *Memorial*, comprised a 'Resource Pack' for which schools could apply, written by Cumbrian historian and broadcaster Eric Robson.

That pack is now freely available to anyone, via the CCHT and CWAAS websites, and provides a wealth of useful website links for getting started in studying your local war memorial, and bringing the past to life by finding out how the war touched the village or local area, and the lives of the ancestors of the children in the school.

By early February, some sixty local primary schools had signed up for the project. It is hoped that each will create a poster or scrapbook for display in the school or local libraries. Then in August, around the time of the centenary of war being declared in 1914, there will be a Memorial Summer Exhibition at Rheged, where the work will be displayed. Schools will also be encouraged to present their work in a way in which it can be posted to the 'Themes' part of the CCHT website, linked to the appropriate township page, so that the hard work of the children can be appreciated by a wider audience.

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
