Family & Local History Day

The Cumbria Family History Society held its annual Fair on Saturday 24th October at The Shepherds Inn, Carlisle. The event was supported by the Cumbria Local History Federation and the North West Group of Family History Societies. There were 140 visitors to the event, which hosted over 40 organisations, including CCHT. Several excellent talks were held throughout the day, three

of which focused on the history of the Dacre family. VCH Volunteer and former Secretary of CCHT, Richard Brockington, spoke about "The Dacre Inheritance, 1569-1601". His research on the Dacres in this period has been published in CWAAS *Transactions* (vol.14 2014) and in a background paper for VCH researchers, which is available on the CCHT website.



Volunteer Meetings and Guidance

Our group of VCH drafters will be meeting in Penrith later this month to discuss progress and the updated guidance notes on religious history. In the New Year we plan to combine this, along with revision for the local government section and introduction, with the other revised notes we have compiled this year into a third (!) edition of our Volunteers' Handbook. The second edition proved very popular, not only with VCH researchers, but other local historians. The new edition will also incorporate the revised national guidance framework, a draft of which is available on the Handbook page of the CCHT website.



Matthew Hyde

We were very saddened to learn of the death of Matthew Hyde, who passed away on 18th September. Matthew was an architectural historian who is perhaps best known in Cumbria for the 2014 book *Arts and Crafts Houses in the Lake District*, which he co-authored with Esme Whittaker, and for his work on The Buildings of England series, which updated the work of Nikolaus Pevsner. The latter volume has been indispensable to our VCH research. Matthew also had close links with Lancaster University and led architectural tours of the University campus as part of the 50th anniversary in 2014. He will be much missed.



Wellcome Library

VCH researchers may be interested to know that you can access a number of historical records and databases as a member of the Wellcome Library. Membership is free and lasts for five years. The only drawback is that you have to apply in person at the Library itself in London. However, once you have done this, you will be able to access remotely a number of online subscription-only resources. Although the Library is one of the world's major resources for the study of medical history, several of the resources its members enjoy are also useful for local history. They include:

- 19th century newspapers and pamphlets
- Letters and diaries
- Early English Books Online (EEBO)
- House of Commons Parliamentary Papers
- The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography
